

CORPUS CHRISTI PROCESSION

Westminster Cathedral Primary School, Westminster

The Bishops of England and Wales held a National Eucharistic Congress in Liverpool on 7-9 September 2018.

A Eucharistic Congress is a gathering of Catholics to witness to the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist and to adore together His supreme act of love. On the last day of the Congress, there was a Eucharistic procession, the first since 1908, and this time the Blessed Sacrament was allowed.

To celebrate this special moment in history, we , too, had a Eucharistic procession to mark the feast of Corpus Christi. In preparation for this, all the classes in the school designed a poster.









WALK WITH JESUS





Westminster Cathedral Primary School, Westminster

As Father Pat took the Blessed Sacrament from the tabernacle – all the children and adults knelt in adoration saying:

Lord, You are so precious to me. Lord, You are so precious to me. And I love You, yes, I love You Because You first loved me.

Once all the children were settled, Canon Pat entered the Church looking very grand in his gold robe.

We all knelt as Canon Pat went to the tabernacle and placed the Blessed Sacrament in a monstrance.

'Jesus said to the crowds:
"I am the bread of life;
whoever comes to me will never hunger,
and whoever believes in me will never thirst."

After each prayer was read we had a time of silence and reflection in front of the Blessed Sacrament, time for us to be at peace in the presence of Our Lord Jesus Christ. We sang:

Jesus, we adore You, Lay our lives before, You How we love You





MEANING OF THE EUCHARIST

Our Lady of Grace, Junior School, Brent

The children in Y3 were introduced to some key vocabulary and had a chance for discussion on words such as Blessed Sacrament, Altar, Tabernacle and Transubstantiation. The children explored how the Eucharist can be represented through art and firstly looked at 'The Sacrament of the Eucharist' by Salvador Dali. They worked in pairs to talk about what they noticed in this picture and how they thought it showed the Eucharist. From this discussion, they then looked at other examples of work that different children had created before firstly creating their own interpretation of what the Eucharist means to them and then choosing one piece to focus on as a class to recreate.

In Y4 we began by discussing the children's personal experiences of the Eucharist. The lesson explained what the Eucharist is and that it is a re-enactment of the Last Supper in Mass. The children created a collage of the bread and wine contemplating the moment in Mass when the bread and wine turns into the body and blood of Christ. Finally, the children wrote a reflective piece on what the Eucharist means to them and how it strengthens their faith.







THE HEART OF THE MATTER



Our Lady of Grace, Junior School, Brent

The children in Y5 discussed what the Eucharist means to them and came up with the following ideas:

Sharing love Commitment to God and each other Friendship with God Forgiveness

Peace - restoring peace with each other and God

Harmony

Hope - of the eternal life we will share with the Father

Community - being with God and loving each other in our community/world

The children then designed an art piece to show their understanding of these concepts. In Year 6 the children wrote Adoremus acrostic poems after looking at the importance of adoring the Eucharist and the mystery of the Eucharist. They wrote their poems in the template of the chalice and host with the rays of light emanating from this image. Water colours were used to create a stained window effect and these have been displayed on the class windows.

WORLD MISSION DAY

Our Lady and St Joseph's Primary School, Tower Hamlets

As part of the OLSJ community, we marked Adoremus in many different ways throughout the school year. To begin with, we designed our book covers using Eucharistic Art as inspiration. each month. We also learned about some iconic figures including St Matthias, St Francis of Assisi and St Frances Cabrini.

Christine Frost and various members of the teaching staff at OLSJ have made many journeys backwards and forwards to the camp in the Calais "Jungle". The last weekend of October, a group of adults spent a day there volunteering with homeless. Sr Chris (governor), Mr Hicklin (teacher) and Emdad (Attendance Officer) made the journey together with other volunteers from Neighbours in Poplar. Firstly, they took over resources collected by the Chaplaincy Team in our school and distributed them to the various shelters and warehouses. Following that, they helped feed over 1,000 people by cooking and cleaning in the community Kitchen. Mr Hicklin returned and celebrated a whole school assembly, showing the children the difference their collection made to those less fortunate.

For World Mission Day, the school collected a range of items to give to the local homeless shelter and to send to refugees in Calais. Our Chaplaincy Team worked effortlessly to ensure there were plenty of resources collected to help those in need.

We invited the children to write letters, cards, prayers and draw pictures for the refugees in to bring a smile to their faces.















WORLD DAY OF THE POOR

Our Lady and St Joseph's Primary School, Tower Hamlets

For World Day of the Poor, we wanted to link what we had learned about the Eucharist to our own Mission. The Chaplaincy Team and School Council went to St Matthias to help with the homeless shelter. Every Tuesday, homeless people come in to eat. They can also sleep in the beds that are provided for them.

It was really exciting for us to help with the cooking; we made vegetarian pasta bake and spaghetti bolognaise: It was important that we made a vegetarian dish because some people in their religion don't eat meat. We helped to make the beds and put out warm socks and toiletries in order for the homeless people to feel as welcome and comfortable as possible.

We also asked questions like, 'What would happen if there were't enough beds?' It was very upsetting to know that those who did not have a bed were forced to sleep outside in the streets. Whilst serving the food that me made, we spoke to an Ethiopian man about his situation. Even though he has nowhere to live, he has a very positive attitude to life and prays that one day his situation will improve.

We were delighted to help people be safe by having a nice warm bed and food in their tummies. We were also excited to feed back to all the children in the school and tell them how they can help those in need.











A number of our schools have been using the Eucharistic art resources, with a different theme and focus each half term.

ETERNAL LIFE



Our Lady of Victories Primary School, Kensington

In Our Lady of Victories we looked at different art forms depicting 'Eternal Life' before creating our own art work.

We looked at symbols of eternal life and drew some. Then we designed our own images of what we think eternal life looks like using black card and pastels.

Y5 created their own art using different styles to represent Jesus' love and life for us and how this gives us eternal life. We used different scripture to support our artwork.

"What has come into being was life, life that was the light of many." (Jn 1:4)



In Year 2 we have been reflecting on the theme of Eternal Life. We talked about Heaven and the colours that we imagined Heaven to be. We all agreed that Heaven would be a beautiful place, so we had a go at painting Heaven's beauty.









CAST OUT YOUR NETS

GOD'S CALL IN OUR LIVES



St Joseph's Primary School, Chelsea

The children from Year 6 at St Joseph's Chelsea were very honoured to be able to attend Allen Hall Seminary as part of their RE topic on Vocations.

They were given a tour of the seminary by Canon Stuart and Deacon Laurence and gained an insight into the training of the seminarians. They then heard first hand accounts from three of the seminarians about their 'calling' into the priesthood.

The session ended with a moving Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament in the chapel.

The children reflected on their experience of the Adoration:

'Then we had a calming and peaceful silence. We asked God to call us for what we should do in our lives. I loved the time in the chapel as it gave me a time to reflect. I thought the day was very spiritual. I knew that God was with me more than ever. It is amazing how much I learnt about my religion and how deep it goes.'

'This was a very peaceful and tranquil time as we kept Jesus in our hearts. I was overwhelmed – I asked God to bless my grandparents (who had died) and keep them safe. Overall the experience was extraordinary – I loved every bit of it.'

Every classroom door in St Joseph's is decorated with pupils' Adoremus work, a number of which is included on the Diocese of Westminster website.









SPECIAL PLACES



Pope Paul Primary School, Enfield

We celebrated Mass at school alongside parishioners and family members. Before the school was led in procession to the Parish Church, Fr Shaun placed the monstrance with the Blessed Sacrament prominently on the 'altar'. This set a tone of reverence; students sensed the awe of the moment. Once seated on the floor, they waited in silence. This was followed by a silent procession to our parish church, Our Lady and St Vincent, where the school community took part in Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament.

The RE Subject Leader, Deputy Head and three members of our parish attended the first day of the Adoremus Conference in Liverpool. Inspired by their visit, they worked with the children to create a special focus in our entrance area.

The creation of a special area inspired some of our children to make Lego representations of the Tabernacle. Eraldo from Year 1 said, "I wanted to make a Lego model of a tabernacle to show where God is."

Taking inspiration from 'My Blessed Sacramental Booklet' from the Diocese of Westminster, we created artwork entitled, "The Bread of Life." Below are some of the exhibits from across our primary school.

On 28 November our school community including parents and parishioners joined together for Eucharistic Adoration at school.

The primary aim of Adoremus in St Adrian's is to promote a personal encounter and relationship with Our Lord Jesus Christ, who is truly present in the Eucharist. In September, we launched a whole school focus on the Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament through an inspiring whole school assembly.

Our focus throughout the year is for everyone in St Adrian's to: develop a knowledge and understanding of the Eucharist; learn how people show respect and reverence in church; explore signs and symbols used by the Church; experience how Jesus shows His love through the Eucharist.

We launched Adoremus with a Blessed Sacrament Procession led by our Parish Priest, Fr Graham Stokes, and our Catholic Life Ambassadors. It encouraged pupils to develop a deeper understanding of the place of the Eucharist in the life of the Church. Pupils are learning to show devotion towards the presence of the Lord Jesus in the Eucharist. Our altar servers and Catholic Life Ambassadors helped prepare four altars to represent earth, wind, fire and water and readings were said at each altar.

Every class has created a tabernacle for their prayer table and produced various pieces of artwork to celebrate the Eucharist, for example, Year 1 made monstrances out of swimming woggles while Year 4 made them out of gold doilies.

Key Stage 2 participated in Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament which was led by Fr Graham. Afterwards they filled out some of the pages from their 'My Blessed Sacrament Booklet'. Members of staff were able to adore the Blessed Sacrament at lunchtime.




POPE'S TWEETS

Each year group was assigned a piece of scripture and a focus linked to Adoremus. Year 1/2 were assigned "Solidarity" and finally Reception/Nursery were assigned "Friendship". Scripture was used to support each of these themes. DEEPENING THE FAITH




St George's, Primary School, Sudbury Hill, Harrow




HOME/SCHOOL LINKS

LET US ADORE



St Joan of Arc, Rickmansworth and Westminster Cathedral Choir School, Westminster

At Joan of Arc pupils have been supported on their Eucharistic journey through the special resources they have been given including 'An Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament Journal' which has guidance for personal prayer when spending time with Our lord in front of the Blessed Sacrament. This includes prayers and various pieces of scriptures recommended for different times in their young lives. Below is part of the guidance on using this journal and scripture to get closer to Jesus in the Eucharist.

Before reading, pray asking God to speak to you through the passage you are about to read.

Read the text slowly, making sure you understand what is written and pay attention to the small details especially in a story that you think you know well.

Close your eyes and imagine the scene. What images are strongest in your mind? What words or phrases stand out to you?

Pray asking God why these images, or words stand out. What is God saying to YOU through this passage?



Write you thoughts down in your journal.



You may also wish to take the time to read a whole book of the Bible through the night. If you wish to do this I recommend Luke or one of the other Gospels. If you don't want to read a Gospel perhaps go for the Acts of the Apostles in the New Testament or Ruth, Esther or Jonah in the Old Testament.

"The role of a priest is to help people come closer to the knowledge and love of God, but always remembering that we are his instruments and that it is God who brings about the growth of love in people. It has been the experience of many that Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament outside of Mass is powerful. The word 'Adoration' comes from the Latin root 'Ad Ora' which means 'to the mouth' and as a doctor (before becoming a priest) this brings to my mind the image of 'Mouth to mouth resuscitation' so breathing the breath of life into us.

My experience of bringing the Blessed Sacrament into the School was profound. I had never imagined that a whole primary school could be in total silence for 20 minutes. And looking at the children's faces – most with eyes tightly shut – they were no doubt experiencing true communication with their loving Heavenly Father.

I am now convinced, more than ever before, that this needs to be incorporated as a regular form of worship in the school. Previously, I thought that young children could not concentrate or sit still for any significant length of time, but the workshop at the Adoremus Congress on 'Teaching children to pray before the Eucharist' showed me that with preparation this was a realistic possibility. The teachers prepared the children and the results showed me that what was said at the Congress was truly achievable."
