Important Secondary CPD for RE and Catholic Life

This half term there are a number of courses coming up for teachers in our secondary RE Departments. There is the Online New Heads of RE on the 5th July <u>HERE</u>. Also if you will have staff teaching RE next academic year who are not subject specialists on the 29th June there is the Online RE for Non-Specialists <u>HERE</u>, a day to support these teachers so they understand the importance of RE in Catholic schools and can recognise misconception that can exist when teaching RE, as well as gaining tips for making RE engaging and accessible to all.

In addition, is crucial that all Heads of RE attend the Heads of RE Online Day on the 25th June <u>HERE</u> as we will have Nancy Conoboy, Chief Inspector, speaking on the new national inspection framework and Philip Robinson from the CES speaking about the new RECD.



New Online Foundation Stones Course - September 2021

A new online Foundation Stones Course will be starting in September. This course introduces participants to the Catholic faith. It takes place online after school making it accessible to all staff. This new course will be running each Monday from the 20th September between 3.30-4.45pm for 10 weeks. NQTS, non-Catholic staff and those wanting to improve their knowledge of Catholicism will benefit greatly from this CPD opportunity. National Professional Qualifications

Study for the full suite of new National Professional Qualifications with the Church of England working in partnership with the Catholic Education Service.

From September the full suite of the new National Professional Qualifications will be delivered nationwide in an exciting new partnership between Catholic and Church of England schools, MATs/ CATs and Teaching School Hubs working with the Church of England Education Office and the Catholic Education Service.

Included in the network of Delivery Partners for the London and South East areas are two of our own Catholic organisations from the Diocese of Westminster: The All Saints Catholic Academy Trust (ASCAT) and The Cardinal Vaughn Memorial School. ASCAT will be taking the lead in the delivery of the NPQLT and will also be supporting delivery of the NPQH, NPQLBC and the NPQEL in the South East area. Cardinal Vaughn will be leading in the delivery of the NPQH and the NPQLT for the London area.

Not only has the content and delivery methods of the qualifications been changed to reflect the challenges of teaching and learning in faith schools in the 21st century but we expect the funding mechanism for these to change also with the National Professional Qualification for Headship (NPQH) and the National Professional Qualification for Leading Teacher Development fully funded for all schools. In addition to this, the DfE have indicated that all NPQs will be fully funded for all schools ranked in the top 30% of schools by Pupil Premium allocation.

CCRS Updates

Calling all teaching staff! Are you in need of a helpful tool for teaching RE in the classroom? Or maybe you are interested in furthering your career in a Catholic School? Are you a Senior Leader who would like to support your staff with CPD, demonstrating your commitment to RE in the Catholic School? The CCRS can provide the answer to all these questions!

We will continue to run the course online, which is nationally certificated. There are a variety of timings to choose from. A new group will commence in September 2021, running on a Saturday (2 Saturdays per module, 10 - 4pm)). There is also a group already running on a Thursday (4-6pm, for five weeks per module). There are 8 modules, usually one each half-term. It normally takes 18 months - 2 years to complete.



(see <u>HERE</u>), this special day encourages children to unite with their sisters and brothers around the world and celebrate, through prayer and action, their valued place in God's universal family.



Season of Creation 1st September - 4th October - The Season of Creation is the annual Christian celebration of prayer and action for our common home. Together, the ecumenical family around the world unites to pray and protect God's creation. The season starts 1 September, the World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation, and ends 4 October, the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi, the patron saint of ecology. The theme this year is "A HOME FOR ALL? RENEWING THE OIKOS OF GOD." Oikos is the Greek word for "home," or "household." Inspection Update

Diocesan Inspection

Diocesan Inspection will resume in September 2021, but the DfE are yet to confirm how long we have to 'catch-up' on inspections that are now overdue. As soon as this information is available, a revised inspection cycle will be provided. Any school inspected next year in Westminster that is not part of the pilot will be inspected under the existing framework. The new National Framework will be fully implemented in September 2022, at which point the existing Framework will become redundant. It is anticipated that the new National Framework Handbook and SEF will be published before the end of this academic year and training will be provided throughout next year. If your school is interested in taking part in the pilot and has not yet expressed an interest, please contact the Chief Inspector using the email address below.

In the coming months, the Diocese will be looking to recruit CSI inspectors for the implementation of the new Framework in September 2022. Further details about the role and application process will be provided when the training schedule is finalised by the CES.



Governance Update

Revised Admissions Code

The 2021 School Admissions Code is available to view by following this link:

School admissions code - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)

The 2021 version has been published, but it is subject to parliamentary approval which should be given in early July. The proposed changes cannot yet be made until they have been approved by parliament and any changes that need to be made (mainly in relation to oversubscription criteria one and possibly in-year applications) will be addressed by the CES once parliamentary approval is given.

If parliament approves the 2021 version it will apply to all admission arrangements from 1 September 2021. The CES has been informed by the Department for Education that they are working on guidance to accompany some of the changes and this will be shared as soon as the proposed changes are confirmed (likely to be early July). We appreciate the timeframes are tight, but this is not within diocesan control. Please contact Tony Gorton tonygorton@rcdow.org.uk for further support.

Process for appointing foundation governors / directors

- 1. We ask that your school appoints a Nominated Person (either the Clerk to Governors or perhaps, someone in the School Office) who will administer this process.
- 2. The Nominated Person should download the suite of forms [available at <u>Link to website</u>] and personalise them to the school, including the email address of the nominated person.
- 3. The Nominated Person will send the application to and receive the application from the applicant.
- 4. The Nominated Person will seek the references and the DBS certification. (Note: the parish priest may wish to return the reference directly to the diocese; if they wish to do this, they have been asked to let the nominated person know).
- 5. When all references and Clearances are available, the Nominated Person will upload all documents to the Diocese using this secure link at: <u>Link to website</u> A receipt will be sent to the Nominated Person and the Applicant on submission.
- 6. The Diocese will determine the complete application within 21 days, either with a letter and deed of appointment, or other communication.

Healthy Start Vouchers

Healthy Start is a government scheme offering low-income pregnant women, pregnant women under the age of 18 and children aged 1-4 years old a voucher per week to purchase fruit and vegetables, pulses, milk or infant formula, as well as vitamins. Since April 2021 the voucher has increased to £4.25 a week.

Take up of Healthy Start vouchers can be as low as 55%, with many families missing out. Schools are encouraged to support eligible families to apply. You can <u>find the criteria of who can apply here</u> and <u>how to apply</u> here.

Healthy Start was not available to those without settled immigration status and with no recourse to public funds. However, a recent court case has led to the scheme being extended to children who were previously excluded because of their parents' immigration status. If you have families at your school with children under 4, no recourse to public funds, and take home pay of less than £408 a month please encourage them to email the Department for Health and Social Care on HealthyStartclaim@dhsc.gov.uk stating that they believe they qualify for Healthy Start.

Deadline for EU Citizens 30th June 2021

The following has been developed by the Roma Support Group, a Caritas Westminster partner:

The deadline is approaching for EU Citizens to secure their immigration status

EU citizens living in the UK have until 30 June 2021 to ensure their immigration status is secured. This can be done through the EU Settlement Scheme. So far over 4.3 million people have been granted status through the scheme. This includes over 700k applications received from children. According to the Migration Observatory, there are over 900k EU children living in the UK.

With only days left to go until the deadline we need to make sure that parents are aware of the need for their children to make applications as well. Parents are advised that it is worth checking if children qualify for British citizens before attempting to make EUSS applications. Those who have British citizenship and those with Indefinite Leave to Remain do not have to apply.

<u>Checklist</u> for applying to the EU Settlement Scheme In many cases, signposting will not be enough – you should ensure that children get help to apply and know how to manage their digital status are they are granted an EUSS status.

- 1. Establish whether children are eligible: either they lived here by 31/12/2020 or have EU/EEA ci(zen parents with an EUSS status (see below for guidance) 2. Support families to establish whether their children qualify for British citizenship (see below)
- 3. Gather the relevant documents including valid ID, proof of 5 years' continuous residence, proof of living in the UK before 31/12/2020
- 4. Help the child to apply online or make a paper application, linking the child's application to their parent's where relevant
- 5. Support the child or family to manage their status are applying and make sure they know about any further deadlines:
 - If they are granted pre-settled status, they will need to reapply for settled status within 5 years.
 - If they get a new passport or email address, they will have to link these to the EUSS account.

Pre-settled status is a temporary immigration status, associated with fewer rights than settled status. Pre-settled status holders have to reapply for settled status within five years or risk losing their legal status altogether.

Where possible, ensure that children get settled status rather than pre-settled status at the outset.

The government has indicated that they will accept late applications where there is an underlying reason for delay. This will be lenient in the early stages. There will be a government announcement on this later this week.
