National Professional Qualifications

Study for the full suite of new National Professional Qualifications with the Church of England working in partnership with the Catholic Education Service.

From September the full suite of the new National Professional Qualifications will be delivered nationwide in an exciting new partnership between Catholic and Church of England schools, MATs/ CATs and Teaching School Hubs working with the Church of England Education Office and the Catholic Education Service.

Included in the network of Delivery Partners for the London and South East areas are two of our own Catholic organisations from the Diocese of Westminster: The All Saints Catholic Academy Trust (ASCAT) and The Cardinal Vaughn Memorial School. ASCAT will be taking the lead in the delivery of the NPQLT and will also be supporting delivery of the NPQH, NPQLBC and the NPQEL in the South East area. Cardinal Vaughn will be leading in the delivery of the NPQH and the NPQLT for the London area.

Not only has the content and delivery methods of the qualifications been changed to reflect the challenges of teaching and learning in faith schools in the 21st century but we expect the funding mechanism for these to change also with the National Professional Qualification for Headship (NPQH) and the National Professional Qualification for Leading Teacher Development fully funded for all schools. In addition to this, the DfE have indicated that all NPQs will be fully funded for all schools ranked in the top 30% of schools by Pupil Premium allocation.

CCRS Updates - Calling all teaching staff and support staff!

Are you in need of a helpful tool for teaching RE in the classroom? Or maybe you are interested in furthering your career in a Catholic School? Are you a Senior Leader who would like to support your staff with CPD, demonstrating your commitment to RE in the Catholic School? The CCRS can provide the answer to all these questions!

We will continue to run the course online, which is nationally certificated. There are a variety of timings to choose from. A new group will commence in September 2021, running on a Saturday (2 Saturdays per module, 10 - 4pm)). There is also a group already running on a Thursday (4-6pm, for five weeks per module). There are 8 modules, usually one each half-term. It normally takes 18 months - 2 years to complete.

Inspection Update

Diocesan Inspection

We are planning for inspection to fully resume in September 2021 and are scheduling accordingly. We are now 4 terms behind where we should be in our current cycle and it is anticipated that it will take at least the same length of time to catch up. The DfE is yet to confirm how long we will have to catch up with our backlog but in the absence of that information we are proceeding by picking up where we left off in March 2020 and will begin by inspecting the schools that should have been inspected in the Spring Term of 2020. When the DfE provide the information on the backlog catch up, you will be provided with a fully revised cycle and it should then be clear what Framework you will be inspected under.

Please note, the current Framework will be redundant from Sept 2022. The existing framework will be replaced in September 2022 with the new National Framework, so any school inspected from September 2022 onwards will be inspected under the new Framework. When the Handbook and SEF are published, they will be shared with you.

Governance Update

Changes to the School Admissions Code

1. The main purpose of the changes to the Code is to improve support for the in-year admission of vulnerable children.

2. The changes include introducing more detail on the process for managing in-year admissions; changes to improve the effectiveness of Fair Access Protocols; giving children adopted from state care outside of England equal admissions priority as children who were previously looked after in England; and clarification of which address to use for the admission of service or crown servant children. There are also further minor clarification changes.

3. A summary of all the changes is attached as Appendix 1, with the most significant changes highlighted in yellow.

- 4. All schools are asked to note these changes.
- 5. Own admission authority schools and academy trusts are asked to take the following action:
 - Review admission arrangements for 2021 and 2022 before 1 September 2021, to ensure that children who are adopted from state care outside of England are given top priority alongside looked after children and other previously looked after children (paragraph 1.7 of the Code)
 - Review the information on their website by 31 October 2021 to ensure it sets out how in year applications will be dealt with from the 1 November 2021 to 31 August 2022. Information to be published must include how parents can apply for a place, a suitable form for parents to complete (where they manage their own in year admissions), supplementary form(s) where necessary. It must also set out when parents will be notified of the outcome and details of their right of appeal. Thereafter this information will need to be updated by 31 August each year for the following school year (paragraph 2.26 of the Code)
 - Ensure processes are in place to notify the LA of the number of places available within two school days of a request (paragraph 2.27 of the Code)
 - Where they manage their own in year applications, review their processes (in line with paragraph 2.30 of the Code) to ensure that, from September 2021:
 - In year applicants are notified of the outcome of their application within 10 school days, or 15 school days at the latest, setting out the reason for refusal and right of appeal;
 - The LA is notified of every application and outcome as soon as is reasonably practicable but within two school days

Admission Arrangements

Admission authorities for state-funded schools designated as having a religious character may use faith-based oversubscription criteria in their admission arrangements and allocate places by reference to faith membership or practice when the school is oversubscribed. The decision as to whether to include such criteria, and how parents must demonstrate membership or practice of the faith, is a decision for the admission authority, in consultation with the relevant body or person representing the religion or religious denomination.

Some admission authorities define membership or practice of the faith as regular attendance at a place of worship over a specified period by parents and their children, as laid out by their religious authority. During the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, there have been periods when the opening of places of worship (especially for public or communal worship) was restricted and many parents and their children will have been unable to attend as normal. This has meant that schools designated as having a religious character, with admission arrangements that prioritise applicants based on regular attendance at a place of worship and/or at public or communal worship, may find their admission arrangements do not work as originally intended for September 2022. As a result, some admission authorities may need to seek a variation to their admission arrangements to ensure parents are clear on what they need to do to meet the relevant criteria.

Process for appointing foundation governors / directors

- 1. We ask that your school appoints a Nominated Person (either the Clerk to Governors or perhaps, someone in the School Office) who will administer this process.
- 2. The Nominated Person should download the suite of forms [available at <u>Link to website</u>] and personalise them to the school, including the email address of the nominated person.
- 3. The Nominated Person will send the application to and receive the application from the applicant.
- 4. The Nominated Person will seek the references and the DBS certification. (Note: the parish priest may wish to return the reference directly to the diocese; if they wish to do this, they have been asked to let the nominated person know).
- 5. When all references and Clearances are available, the Nominated Person will upload all documents to the Diocese using this secure link at : <u>Link to website</u> A receipt will be sent to the Nominated Person and the Applicant on submission.
- 6. The Diocese will determine the complete application within 21 days, either with a letter and deed of appointment, or other communication.

Pupil Placement Planning

1st Planner Project

Rebecca Butler from 1st Planner is in the process of writing to all schools (starting with those in the pilot areas) regarding pupil data for mapping purposes. The following helps to explain the rational:

Request

We are writing to request that all Archdiocese of Westminster schools forward the postcodes of their current pupils to support 1st Planner with identifying and securing capital funding through the work that they are completing for the Diocese around the "Win-Win Initiative" that has been developed over the last 18 months.



Background

1st Planner are collecting huge amounts of data around space within each of the schools, future pupil projections (including catholicity), Local Authority pressures and mapping what capital funding is available. This includes both Basic Need and High Needs funding as well as Section 106 & Community Infrastructure (CIL) contributions.

This identification of funding is being completed at a Local Authority level and in order to secure a proportion of this when we engage with each of the councils, we need to be able to precisely map the pupils in order to demonstrate that there is an entitlement to access the capital to invest in the Diocese's school estate.

In previous years, <u>www.schoolguide.co.uk</u> provided a reliable and accurate method of mapping pupils with locality information being provided directly by the Department for Education. Unfortunately, this year the accuracy of the information has reduced considerably, particularly where schools have wide catchment areas, which is often the case with Catholic pupil cohorts.

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To ensure that we are able to access as

much of the identified funding as possible, it has been agreed that this additional step is essential, and we would be extremely grateful for your support in providing the pupil postcodes for all of your current pupils to facilitate this.

Data Format/Data Protection

To comply with GDPR, the only information we require is the full home postcodes for each of your pupils as an excel spreadsheet. Please do not provide any unique identifiers such as date of birth, gender, name, address etc.

Rebecca Butler, 1st Planner's Operations Manager will provide individual data sharing agreements for each of the schools. One this has been issued, please forward your pupil postcode lists to rebecca.butler@1stplanner.com. Rebecca's contact number is 07841 118 779, if any further information/clarification is required.

How the Data will be Utilised

Once the data has been received, it will be fully anonymised by only utilising the information at postcode prefix level. Using "DE4 3PA" as an example, the information will be presented as "DE4 3". This information will be used to show total pupils within each of the relevant postcode prefixes in graphs/charts and visually within maps when sharing the information with the Local Authorities.

Sharing Information with Schools

Once the pupil data information has been processed, we will then send this back to the schools as a useful resource that can be used internally within each of the settings to visualise where their pupils originate from.

Built into the spreadsheets that will be shared will be graphs/charts and automated maps, which will be issued along with a video explaining how the information is interpreted and how the graphics can be modified to suit the individual school's requirements.

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Next Steps

Once all of the information has been collected and collated, it will be used to inform high-level development plans for each school that are based on the recently completed Statlog Surveys. In accordance with the "Win Win" Charter developed collaboratively with the Archdiocese of Westminster's Trustees, (based on the Catholic Social Teaching Principles as shown below), we will be looking to access the capital funding to improve the schools whilst supporting the relevant Local authorities with resolving with their respective pressures.

Thank you very much for supporting with this vital step in the collection and presentation of pupil level data that will provide the necessary evidence base to substantiate our requests to access considerable capital funds to invest in the Archdiocese of Westminster's school estate.
