#### National Professional Qualifications

Study for the full suite of new National Professional Qualifications with the Church of England working in partnership with the Catholic Education Service.

All Saints

From September the full suite of the new National Professional Qualifications will be delivered nationwide in an exciting new partnership between Catholic and Church of England schools, MATs/ CATs and Teaching School Hubs working with the Church of England Education Office and the Catholic Education Service.

Included in the network of Delivery Partners for the London and South East areas are two of our own Catholic organisations from the Diocese of Westminster: The All Saints Catholic Academy Trust (ASCAT) and The Cardinal Vaughn Memorial School. ASCAT will be taking the lead in the delivery of the NPQLT and will also be supporting delivery of the NPQH, NPQLBC and the NPQEL in the South East area. Cardinal Vaughn will be leading in the delivery of the NPQH and the NPQLT for the London area.

Not only has the content and delivery methods of the qualifications been changed to reflect the challenges of teaching and learning in faith schools in the 21<sup>st</sup> century but we expect the funding mechanism for these to change also with the National Professional Qualification for Headship (NPQH) and the National Professional Qualification for Leading Teacher Development fully funded for all schools. In addition to this, the DfE have indicated that all NPQs will be fully funded for all schools ranked in the top 30% of schools by Pupil Premium allocation.

# Inspection Update

After an eighteen-month suspension, diocesan inspections have resumed. The DfE has confirmed the i**nspection** cycle will be extended to 8 years from the previous inspection for the first inspection after 1 September 2021. Once a routine inspection takes place after 1 September 2021, the school's next inspection will revert to the standard five-year interval.

As you know, **the new national Framework comes into place from September 2022** and to ensure we provide clarity for schools about what framework they will be inspected under, the date of the previous inspection has been the deciding factor. In practice this means -

- Schools judged to be good or outstanding that were inspected between 1 September 2014 and 1 March 2016 will be inspected this academic year (September 2021 July 2022) under the existing framework.
- Schools judged to be RI and that are overdue will be inspected this academic year (September 2021 July 2022) under the existing framework.
- Schools that were inspected between 2 March 2016 and 15 July 2016 will be inspected under the new Catholic School Inspectorate framework from September 2022 onwards.
- Schools inspected after 15 July 2016 will be inspected under the new Catholic School Inspectorate framework from September 2022 onwards.

Work continues on Westminster's fully revised cycle which will be shared in due course.

The Catholic Schools Inspectorate has provided us with the Grade Descriptors/Evaluation Schedule and a draft of the Inspection Handbook, both of which have been emailed to schools.

#### **CSI Inspector Applications**

Applications are open. If you are already an inspector, you will have to reapply as it is effectively a new role. To be eligible to apply you have to:

- Be a practising Catholic
- Be a qualified teacher
- Work in a school that is good or better Ofsted and Sec 48
- Be a reserved post holder or Asst Head
- Hold a current DBS
- Have the permission of your employer
- Be proposed by the Diocese

Our service has always been successful because we have had serving teachers and school leaders. It is a fantastic opportunity and serves as great professional development, so please explore this with your leadership teams and RE Leads. The <u>deadline for applications is 31 October 2021</u>. ## Governance Update

#### School Admission Appeals Arrangements

As you may recall, in April 2020, temporary regulations (<u>The School Admissions (England) (Coronavirus) (Appeals Arrangements)</u> (Amendment) Regulations 2020) (the "Temporary Regulations") and accompanying <u>guidance</u> were introduced which gave admission authorities, local authorities and admission appeal panels more flexibility when dealing with admission appeals during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Temporary Regulations provide flexibility which enable appeals to go ahead where it is not reasonably practicable to follow the normal process in accordance with the School Admission Appeals Code, for a reason relating to the COVID-19 pandemic. These flexibilities include holding appeal hearings by telephone or video conference or enabling appeals to be decided on the basis of written submission only. Statutory timescales were also revised.

The Temporary Regulations were extended in January 2021 by <u>The School Admissions (England) (Coronavirus)</u> (Appeal Arrangements) (Amendment) Regulations 2021 and they are due to expire on 30 September 2021. Following a review of the Temporary Regulations with a range of stakeholders, the Department has proposed a further extension to the Temporary Regulations beyond the end of September 2021. <u>The School Admissions (England) (Coronavirus)</u> (Appeal Arrangements) (Amendment) (No.2) Regulations 2021 (the "2021 (No.2) Regulations"), further extending the Temporary Regulations, were laid before Parliament on 8 September. Subject to Parliamentary approval, these regulations will come into force on 30 September 2021 and will have the effect of extending the Temporary Regulations for a further year until 30 September 2022. No other policy changes have been made.

The Department also plans to update the current published guidance to reflect the change of the expiry date. This will become available on 30 September, subject to Parliament approving the 2021 (No.2) Regulations.

We will update you on the outcome of the Parliamentary process as soon as we receive further information.

#### Process for appointing foundation governors / directors

- 1. We ask that your school appoints a Nominated Person (either the Clerk to Governors or perhaps, someone in the School Office) who will administer this process.
- 2. The Nominated Person should download the suite of forms [available <u>here</u>] and personalise them to the school, including the email address of the nominated person.
- 3. The Nominated Person will send the application to and receive the application from the applicant.
- 4. The Nominated Person will seek the references and the DBS certification. (Note: the parish priest may wish to return the reference directly to the diocese; if they wish to do this, they have been asked to let the nominated person know).
- 5. When all references and Clearances are available, the Nominated Person will upload all documents to the Diocese using this secure link <u>here</u>. A receipt will be sent to the Nominated Person and the Applicant on submission.
- 6. The Diocese will determine the complete application within 21 days, either with a letter and deed of appointment, or other communication.

# Mental Health Update - Resilience

The importance of building resilience in children and young people in supporting their mental health and well-being

#### Resilience and its importance to well-being

Having a positive sense of well-being enables children and young people to function in society and meet the many demands that they face each day. Having a good mental health also enables them to recover from illness, change and adverse experiences that they may encounter. Wellbeing is all about our holistic health, including the physical and emotional. When children and young people have good levels of wellbeing they feel that life is in balance and that they can generally cope well. They also feel motivated and engaged. They are resilient and able to deal effectively with daily troubles, as well as 'bounce back' from life's challenges. Resilience is therefore described as the capacity to 'bounce back' from adverse experiences, and succeed despite adversity. In order for children to cope with life's challenges, and retain a positive sense of well-being, children need to develop and maintain this ability to 'bounce back'.

#### Risk factors that impact on resilience in children and young people

Many children and young people experience a wide range of challenges that can impact on their ability to be resilient and therefore having a negative effect on their well-being and ultimately adversely affecting their mental health. Some threats or risk factors are very serious, such as maltreatment and neglect, but young people also have to be resilient in the face of more ordinary everyday pressures such as family disruption and academic stress. Threats/risk factors to a child or young person's well-being come in many forms including:

Poverty and deprivation; Maltreatment and neglect; Parental mental health problems or addiction; Long term health conditions of parents or self; Family disruption, or pressures of caring for others; Bullying and social media issues; Peer problems, relationship stresses, or pressures from substance use; Pressures on body confidence

However, this is not an exhaustive list and there are many physical and environmental factors that can impact on a child or young person. Risk factors can be categorised into five areas. These include family; the individual, their peers, their school. It is therefore of great importance to support and aid children in developing and maintaining these coping strategies and building their resilience to adverse experiences.

#### Building a child or young person's resilience

The aim is to support successful coping or 'bouncing back'; adaptation to life tasks in the face of any kind of disadvantage or adversity, and schools and colleges have an important part to play in this, supporting children and young people in building their resilience. For other everyday stresses and pressures there are a wide range of strategies that schools can adopt.



Qualities of Resilience		
Resilience doesn't develop in isolation. There are many other qualities which impact on and affect resilience - the main ones can be summarised as follows:		
Self-esteem	Being accepted by people whose relationship you value, and from completing tasks you value.	
Self-efficacy	Having the qualities of optimism; 'stickability' and believing that one's own efforts can make a difference.	
Trust	Experience people as reliable, value them and expect them not to betray your confidence.	
Attachment	A secure attachment relationship creates a secure base from which a young person feels safe to explore the world.	
Secure Base	The provision of a consistent and stable place to live and continuity of wider relationships which then allow the maintenance or development of attachment relationships	
Meaningful Roles	Provide a sense of positive identity and a source of self-esteem as well as a source of enjoyment and distraction	
Autonomy	Make decisions and know that it is OK to make mistakes and that you can learn from mistakes.	
Identity	Young people need to know and understand who they are, where they belong and to whom they are important.	
Insight	Helps people to take appropriate actions and make appropriate choices. It is therefore linked to self-efficacy and to initiative.	
Humour	Can help young people to distance themselves from, and therefore reduce, emotional pain and it can also help them make and sustain relationships.

#### Keep the Lifeline

In March 2020, at the start of the pandemic, the Government made an important decision to give an extra £20 a week to those receiving Universal Credit, helping those on the lowest incomes to continue paying their bills and feeding their families during an uncertain time. At the beginning of October 2021 the Government is planning to cut this £20 a week overnight, **leaving six million families £1,040 worse off a year**. For many, this money is the difference between keeping afloat and falling into serious poverty.

At Caritas Westminster we work with hundreds of social action projects and see the real problems people are facing daily to get by. We know as teachers you will also be very familiar with the challenges people are facing and the difference this cut to their income will make. We want the Government to understand how hard this cut will hit those we work with and reverse their decision to take away £20 a week from those on the lowest incomes.

By sharing your knowledge of how people in their constituencies will be affected you can really put pressure on the government to reverse the cut and stop people being pulled deeper into poverty. #### Capital

Statlog Engagement – Statutory Compliance



Many schools are now making good use of this facility. Insurers and the Health and Safety Executive are currently seeking verifiable evidence of compliance management, and thanks to the engagement of our schools, we are in a strong position to provide such evidence.

Governors are advised to check that the Statlog Statutory Compliance Module is being fully utilised in their school(s). The Diocesan Trustees has confirmed to Insurers and the HSE that all school occupying land owned by, or otherwise controlled by them are directed to use Statlog. Failure to provide evidence of use on demand may compromise insurance claims or HSE investigations.

#### Project Manager Lite (Change Affecting Many Schools)

All schools with a Statlog Licence now have full access to this module. Shortly, we will be writing to all local authority auditors to confirm that only works sanctioned through Statlog can be recorded as bonafide Capital Works.

Similar correspondence with the DfE/ESFA is anticipated regarding academies.

Over the summer, the project team has been looking at options for presenting data and options in a palatable way. The portal has been expanded to allow for the significant amount of new data we have secured. Schools will be provided with access to the data that is specific to their situation. The process for accessing the secure datasets within the portal will be confirmed shortly.

#### **Decarbonisation**

Using data from Statlog and  $1^{st}$  Planner, the Zeco, on behalf of the Diocese, submitted a proposal to secure funding for the development of <u>Heat Decarbonisation Plans</u> we expect to hear the outcome of our application shortly.
