### CCRS

In the CES Census return, some schools have recorded a low number of staff with CCRS or they have recorded that TAs are teaching RE lessons. The CCRS may be able to help you upskill staff for the important role of teaching RE. It will give them a basic theological knowledge and is suitable for all staff. ### National Professional Qualifications

Study for the full suite of new National Professional Qualifications with the Church of England working in partnership with the Catholic Education Service.

From September the full suite of the new National Professional Qualifications will be delivered nationwide in an exciting new partnership between Catholic and Church of England schools, MATs/ CATs and Teaching School Hubs working with the Church of England Education Office and the Catholic Education Service.

Included in the network of Delivery Partners for the London and South East areas are two of our own Catholic organisations from the Diocese of Westminster: The All Saints Catholic Academy Trust (ASCAT) and The Cardinal Vaughn Memorial School. ASCAT will be taking the lead in the delivery of the NPQLT and will also be supporting delivery of the NPQH, NPQLBC and the NPQEL in the South East area. Cardinal Vaughn will be leading in the delivery of the NPQH and the NPQLT for the London area.

Not only has the content and delivery methods of the qualifications been changed to reflect the challenges of teaching and learning in faith schools in the 21<sup>st</sup> century but we expect the funding mechanism for these to change also with the National Professional Qualification for Headship (NPQH) and the National Professional Qualification for Leading Teacher Development fully funded for all schools. In addition to this, the DfE have indicated that all NPQs will be fully funded for all schools ranked in the top 30% of schools by Pupil Premium allocation.

## Inspection Update

### **CSI Inspector Applications**

The application <u>deadline of 31 October 2021</u> is fast approaching. Please note that if you are already an inspector, you will have to reapply as it is effectively a new role. To be eligible to apply you have to:

- Be a practising Catholic
- Be a qualified teacher
- Work in a school that is good or better Ofsted and Sec 48
- Be a reserved post holder or Asst Head
- Hold a current DBS
- Have the permission of your employer
- Be proposed by the Diocese

Our service has always been successful because we have had serving teachers and school leaders. ### **Diocesan Inspection**

After an eighteen-month suspension, diocesan inspections have resumed. The DfE has confirmed the i**nspection** cycle will be extended to 8 years from the previous inspection for the first inspection after 1 September 2021. Once a routine inspection takes place after 1 September 2021, the school's next inspection will revert to the standard five-year interval.

As you know, **the new national Framework comes into place from September 2022** and to ensure we provide clarity for schools about what framework they will be inspected under, the date of the previous inspection has been the deciding factor. In practice this means -

- Schools judged to be good or outstanding that were inspected between 1 September 2014 and 1 March 2016 will be inspected this academic year (September 2021 July 2022) under the existing framework.
- Schools judged to be RI and that are overdue will be inspected this academic year (September 2021 July 2022) under the existing framework.
- Schools that were inspected between 2 March 2016 and 15 July 2016 will be inspected under the new Catholic School Inspectorate framework from September 2022 onwards.
- Schools inspected after 15 July 2016 will be inspected under the new Catholic School Inspectorate framework from September 2022 onwards.

Work continues on Westminster's fully revised cycle which will be shared in due course.

The Catholic Schools Inspectorate has provided us with the Grade Descriptors/Evaluation Schedule and a draft of the Inspection Handbook, both of which have been emailed to schools.

### Information Sessions on the New National Framework

An information session on the new National Framework will be available to headteachers after the October half term. If headteachers are not able to attend, they can nominate one person to attend in their place. The intention is to provide an overview of the new Framework whilst highlighting how it differs from the existing one. There will also be an opportunity to ask questions. The same session is being offered times via Zoom to provide flexibility. Separate sessions for subject leads, chaplains and governors are planned for later in the academic year. ### **Black History Month**



### **Black History Tube Map**

Transport for London have teamed up with the Black Cultural Archives to launch the first ever Black History Tube map, celebrating the rich and varied contribution Black people have made to London and the UK from Pre Tudor times to the present day.

The Black Cultural Archives is the home of Black British History, conceived in 1981 as a monument to hold space and collect, preserve and celebrate the histories of people of African and Caribbean descent in the UK to inspire and give strength to individuals, communities and society.

From the woman who both founded Britain's first major Black newspaper and co-founder of Notting Hill Carnival, to London-based Georgian entrepreneur Cesar Picton. There's plenty to be seen across all lines!

### Governance Update

### **School Admissions**

When changes are proposed to admission arrangements, all admission authorities must consult on their admission arrangements (including any supplementary information form) that will apply for admission applications the following school year. Where the admission arrangements have not changed from the previous year there is no requirement to consult, subject to the requirement that admission authorities must consult on their admission arrangements at least once every 7 years, even if there have been no changes during that period.

### **CES Policies**

Now that the consultation window has opened for Admission Policies for the year 2023/24, we would like to emphasise to all schools the importance of using and following the model admissions policies from the CES that are on the Diocesan website, remembering that if you make any changes to the oversubscription criteria, you should retain, as far as possible, the order as set out in the model policies. Model policies are available for primary & secondary and for schools using the CCP and not.

We would also like to recommend the importance of using the CES staffing policies available on their website – Sickness Absence, Disciplinary, Grievance, and Capability. Whilst these policies are available in an amendable format on the CES website, we would strongly advise that you only amend to include your school details and leave the rest as set out by the legal team at the CES. In doing this we are better able to support you in the event of finding yourselves needing support and guidance because of a staffing issue.

### Process for appointing foundation governors / directors

- 1. We ask that your school appoints a Nominated Person (either the Clerk to Governors or perhaps, someone in the School Office) who will administer this process.
- 2. The Nominated Person should download the suite of forms [available <u>here</u>] and personalise them to the school, including the email address of the nominated person.
- 3. The Nominated Person will send the application to and receive the application from the applicant.
- 4. The Nominated Person will seek the references and the DBS certification. (Note: the parish priest may wish to return the reference directly to the diocese; if they wish to do this, they have been asked to let the nominated person know).
- 5. When all references and Clearances are available, the Nominated Person will upload all documents to the Diocese using this secure link <u>here</u>. A receipt will be sent to the Nominated Person and the Applicant on submission.
- 6. The Diocese will determine the complete application within 21 days, either with a letter and deed of appointment, or other communication.

## Spotlight on Mental Health

### St Mary and St Michael Catholic Primary School



This Sunday, 10<sup>th</sup> October marked World Mental Health Day, a time to reflect, and put the spotlight on the issue of mental health and well-being. In recognition of need to promote positive mental health and wellbeing across the schools in the Diocese, the Education Service are keen for schools to share the wonderful work they do in supporting their communities, including pupils, parents and staff alike

One such school, prior to the lockdown, won the biennial Place2Be Well-being in Schools Award in the category of Champion Head. Mrs Mahon, Headteacher at St Mary and Michael Catholic Primary School in Stepney, along with her dedicated team, have been awarded this prize in recognition of the sterling work that they do to support their school community. In summary, this stems from her compassionate understanding of the challenges her community faces, and how this informs her of their needs on a daily basis. This is demonstrated in the school's ethos, which believes in developing the whole child and the school's core values of compassion, collaboration, perseverance, respect and self-worth. This ethos and the core values are reflected in the school curriculum, and the promotion of well-being and emotional literacy for children. Under Mrs Mahon's leadership, the school has adopted a personal approach, investing in various initiatives that support both pupils and parents. Bespoke support is also given to families according to their level of need. An example of the many things the school does in the promotion of positive mental health and well-being are:

- Earmarking a substantial proportion of the school's budget to maintaining an in-house Place2Be service.
- Pupils receive weekly PSHE lessons that focus on emotional literacy, social skills and spiritual development.
- Timetabled art, drama and music ensure that children have an opportunity to express themselves.
- Key dates in the school calendar include Mental Health Week and Anti-Bullying Week, and pupils are selected each year as Anti-Bullying Ambassadors
- The school trialled a new parenting programme to help vulnerable parents and carers develop a healthy family life.
- The headteacher is present in the playground every morning to greet families at the school gate and a listening ear to their concerns
- One morning during winter there was a snowstorm and the playground was carpeted in snow. The headteacher instructed her staff to cancel lessons and send the children outside to play, promising a prize for the best snowman. "Most of them have nowhere at home to play outdoors," she explained.



### Capital

Statlog – Statutory Compliance

One school has registered as a Statlog user since my last update.

The use of Statlog is required for a) Schools and Academies occupying Diocesan Trust Land and b) any other Catholic VA School seeking access to potential Grant Funding via VASCA.

Academies occupying Land and Building owned by Religious Orders are not compelled to use Statlog. However, the facility is available to every Catholic School in the Diocese. The Education Service is regularly asked to represent the needs of the Catholic School in the Diocese at meetings with Government Departments. Unfortunately, the lack of strategic data from some schools will mean that the team is unable to properly represent the needs of those schools.

145 surveys are now complete or nearing completion. This leaves 21 surveys to be completed before all licenced schools are surveyed. As indicated later in this bulletin, Statlog Data is used to bid for funding on behalf of schools and, until your school's survey is uploaded, you may be missing out on grant opportunities.

### Project Manager Lite (Change Affecting Many Schools)

All Statlog Schools have full access to the Project Manager module. Please ensure that all capital work planned for your school is processed using this tool.

Access to the Matched Funding School (VA Schools) terminates on December 31<sup>st</sup>.

### Priority School Building Programme

Project managers continue to monitor the progress of schools in this scheme.

### **Approved Initiatives**

### Condition Data Collection (CDC)

The Government has commenced the latest round of its Condition Data Collection process. Schools will be contacted by surveyors appointed by the Government. This process is monitored by the Education Service, but we do not normally attend any of the engagement sessions. The surveyors are expected to contact you in advance of any proposed site visit. Please contact <u>nigelspears@rcdow.org.uk</u> if you have any questions about this process. If we receive advanced notification of a block of visits, we will publish that list in the bulletin.

### Land and Buildings Collection Tool (LBCT)

This initiative affects Academies only. The LBCT is live and closes in early November. Please ensure that <u>nigelspears@rcdow.org.uk</u> is registered as the Diocesan Checker on your return to avoid any delay in the processing of your submission.

Please note: You must upload a copy of the Land Registry Title (and Plan) for every parcel of land owned by the Church (Diocese or Religious Order).

### Insurance Validation

The Catholic Insurance Service and Zurich have commissioned an audit and appraisal of schools insured via the CIS. The Diocesan Trustees are paying for this initiative and targeted schools will be approached by a company called Charterfields. If your school is targeted during this initiative, please supply Charterfields with the data and access they required.
