Leadership and Governance Update

Leadership and Governance

There are many "housekeeping" tasks to carry out at the start of a new term and some of them involve several people! Unfortunately, there are three different lists to update for Governors; Governorhub, Get information about Schools and your own school website. Please could the staff responsible for these updates make sure that all three are correct and showing the same information.

We communicate with governors via Governorhub, so please make sure that the roles of governors are recorded on your own school pages so that we are able to go to the correct person each time. We do not have editing rights to your pages and so rely on you to keep these up to date.

Creating a Culture of Accompaniment (LGBT+)

In 2022 and 2023 the Education Service facilitated training for school leaders and chaplains to help create a culture of accompaniment within schools for people who are LGBT+. We are re-running these training days for those who did not attend or in case there has been a change of personnel. If no one from your school attended or the person in charge of the school or pastoral care has changed since then please book on to the relevant course

Transform the hearts and minds of all those who perpetuate violence and oppression.


Grant wisdom to world leaders in advancing efforts toward world peace;





Year of Prayer - 2024



In preparation for the 2025 Jubilee Year 'Pilgrims of Hope', 2024 has been designated a Year of Prayer by Pope Francis. There is a particular focus on the Lord's Prayer (Our Father) this year, and this presents us with a great opportunity to reinvigorate the centrality of prayer within our schools. The Education Service will be producing resources from January 2024 to support schools with the Year of Prayer.

Within the next few weeks, an introductory resource for the Year of Prayer will be shared. Following this, there will be both primary and secondary resources sent to all schools that will unpack the Lord's Prayer. 






Secondary RED Implementation

What is the John Paul II Award

The Pope John Paul II Award is a faith achievement award for young people between the age of 16 and 18. It is non-competitive, inclusive, flexible and voluntary.



The Award enables participants to take an active part in the life of their Church – in the life of their community and society. It enables young people to become more aware of the teaching and role of the Catholic Church in the world and to engage at a deep level with Christ.

What is the Faith in Action Award?

The Faith in Action Award encourages young people through recognising, rewarding and celebrating their active faith lived out through service and reflection. The Award helps them connect their life and faith in a tangible



manner. In journeying through the Award, young people should experience a deepening of their relationship with God and find themselves exploring that relationship. It is hoped that through their relationship and action, others will see God's love through them.

Who is it for?

Young people aged 10-18 years old (Year 6 - 13) can take part in the Faith in Action Award through their school, parish or organisation. The Faith in Action Award is accessible to, and inclusive of, all young people, regardless of academic ability.

The 4 award levels

There are four levels to the Faith in Action Award - from Pin through to Gold.

The progression of the Award reflects the spiritual and personal growth of the participants through acquiring more credits of service and showing a greater level of commitment and leadership.




historical and socio-cultural paths of religious teachings and to bring contemporary and practical relevance to them, whilst also keeping an eye on Catholic or Christian touchpoints or needs concerning Islam or Muslims. More information is available here

What does it mean to be human?

This is an inperson event being held in Winchester on Saturday 16th March 2024 focusing on modern medical ethics and social care.

The event has been crafted as part of the work of our Dialogue with Cultural Sectors Team, members of



whom work across a range of fields (including education, medicine, business, the law and politics) and who seek to bring the Catholic tradition into critical conversations with the thinking and philosophy behind these professional sectors.

Over the past couple of years the team have successfully organised two symposia featuring key note addresses, workshops and critical discussions – *Science and Religion* featured celebrity scientist and professor, Dr Brian Cox and Fr Andrew Pinsent, Catholic priest and CERN physicist. *Politics and Religion*, featured Jacob Rees-Mogg MP, Ruth Kelly MP and Lord David Alton.

Given the relevance and importance of the subject, we are naturally really keen to optimise the number of attendees. Whilst many in the audience will be Catholic, we hope many others will come so that they can hear Catholic viewpoints expressed by experts in their respective fields.

The Symposium will feature presentations from well-known experts and is led by David Wells, the popular motivational speaker. It is open to people of all faiths and none, specialist and lay, to students and to anyone with an interest in medical and social care.

Saints from Racial and Cultural Inclusion

Saint Charles Lwanga:

St Charles Lwanga who was a Ugandan convert to the Catholic Church who was martyred with a group of his peers and is revered as a saint by both the Catholic Church and the Anglican Communion.

Saint Lorenzo of Manila

St Lorenzo of Manila, is a Filipino saint venerated in the Catholic Church. A Chinese Filipino, he became his country's protomartyr after his execution in Japan during its persecution of Japanese Christians in the 17th century.

Saint Rita of Cascia

St Rita of Cascia, was an Italian widow and Augustinian nun. One of the most popular Saints in the Church for centuries, St. Rita is known as the "Saint of the Impossible" because of her amazing answers to prayers, as well as the remarkable events of her own life.

Desirous of being a nun, she instead obeyed her parents and married. Her husband was cruel, and caused her much suffering, to which she responded with love and prayers, eventually converting him. After the death of her husband and two sons, Rita was able to enter a convent, where she devoted herself to prayer and penance.





Euphrasia Eluvathingal (born Rosa Eluvathingal; 17 October 1877 – 29 August 1952) was an Indian Carmelite nun of the Syro-Malabar Church, which is an Eastern Catholic Church in Kerala. Euphrasia is said to have had a vision of the Holy Family, at which point the illness she had long felt ceased. She was canonised as a saint by Pope Francis on 23 November 2014 in Vatican City.

Saint Stanislaus of Poland

St Stanislaus of Poland was Bishop of Kraków known chiefly for having been martyred by the Polish King Bolesław II the Generous. Stanislaus is venerated in the Roman Catholic Church as Saint Stanislaus the Martyr (as distinct from the 16th-century Jesuit Stanislaus Kostka).

Saint Augustine Zhao Rong

St Augustine Zhao Rong - Father Augustine, was the first native-born Chinese priest and the first Chinese priest to be martyred. He was originally a soldier entrusted with the task of transporting to Beijing French Bishop John Gabriel Taurin. During the long journey, the bishop greatly impressed Zhao Rong with his kindness and peaceful demeanor in the face of persecution. Zhao Rong requested and received baptism after learning about the Catholic faith. Taking the name Augustine, he was later ordained a priest. After his arrest, he was offered the opportunity to renounce the Catholic faith but refused. After horrific tortures, Father Augustine died of his injuries in prison.

Saint Joseph Vaz

St Joseph Vaz - Catholic Oratorian priest from Goa. He is known as the Apostle of Ceylon. Fr. Vaz entered Ceylon (now Sri Lanka) during the Dutch occupation, when Calvinism was the official religion. He travelled throughout the island bringing the Eucharist and the sacraments to clandestine groups of Catholics. At the time of his death, Fr. Vaz managed to rebuild the Catholic church on the island. On 21 January 1995, he was beatified by Pope John Paul II in Colombo.

Saint Josephine Bhakita

St Josephine Bhakita - venerated as a modern African saint, and as a statement against the brutal history of slavery. She has been adopted as the patron saint of modern Sudan.

Saint Martin de Porres


Saint Martin de Porres from Peru patron saint of mixed-race people, barbers, innkeepers, public health workers, and all those seeking racial harmony, and animals.

Saints Perpetua and Felicity

In the eyes of the world, Saints Perpetua and Felicity were separated by status: one a well-educated noblewoman, the other a servant or slave, Yet, in life and in death, these two women from early 3rd century Carthage, North Africa, were sisters in Christ and both were martyred for their faith in A.D. 203, under the emperor Severus.

At the time of their arrest, Perpetua had an infant son, and Felicity was pregnant While she was in prison, Perpetua wrote about the circumstances leading up to their death in a diary that was later published as The Passion of Saints Perpetua and Felicity. We know of Perpetua and Felicity's story because of the diary Perpetua kept while she and her companions were awaiting execution. Not only is this text rare for its account of early Church martyrs in the days leading up to their deaths, but it is one of the earliest first-person narratives by a woman writer.

YEAR 5 RETREAT

This retreat brings Children on a Journey aimed at helping them to see that God wants them to live "life the full".
