Schools are having to manage an increasing number of pupils with complex needs. Whilst schools are generally keen to be inclusive, dealing with the assessment and funding of SEND provision and managing practical considerations, including the behavioural challenges which often sit alongside SEND can be challenging for SENCOs, senior leaders and governors.

The <u>School Support Service</u> team at Winckworth Sherwood will be hosting a three-part free webinar series on all things SEND related on **9 February**, **14 March and 2 May 2024**, drawing on our experience of advising schools and trusts and representing clients in the SEND Tribunal.

Year of Prayer - 2024






Prayer and Liturgy Directory Updates



God of light and truth, you call all men and women to live lives of holiness and justice.


Help us to see in one another: a heart which is tender, a mind which is humble and a care for our brothers and sisters;








Secondary RED Implementation


Catholic Life and Mission Conference Day – Thank you!

Muslim Studies

Muslim Studies is a brand-new course and is hosted by the Centre for Catholic Education, Research and Religious Literacy, as part of its outreach programme in developing faith literacy. It offers an exciting opportunity to study a religion that roughly one in four persons in the world adheres to in varying ways. The course in



Muslim Studies assumes little or no knowledge of Islam and will explore topics at an introductory level. It will seek to explore historical and socio-cultural paths of religious teachings and to bring contemporary and practical relevance to them, whilst also keeping an eye on Catholic or Christian touchpoints or needs concerning Islam or Muslims. What does it mean to be human?

This is an in-person event being held in Winchester on **Saturday 16th March** 2024 focusing on modern medical ethics and social care.

The event has been crafted as part of the work of our Dialogue with Cultural Sectors Team, members of whom work across a range of fields (including education, medicine, business, the law and politics) and who seek to



bring the Catholic tradition into critical conversations with the thinking and philosophy behind these professional sectors.

Over the past couple of years the team have successfully organised two symposia featuring key note addresses, workshops and critical discussions – *Science and Religion* featured celebrity scientist and professor, Dr Brian Cox and Fr Andrew Pinsent, Catholic priest and CERN physicist. *Politics and Religion*, featured Jacob Rees-Mogg MP, Ruth Kelly MP and Lord David Alton.

Given the relevance and importance of the subject, we are naturally really keen to optimise the number of attendees. 

Inspection Updates

Ofsted, the Prevention of Death order, and the Catholic Schools Inspectorate:

As many of you will be aware, the coroner concluded that the Ofsted inspection was a contributory factor in the tragic death of Ruth Perry. As a consequence, they have been issued with a Prevention of Future Deaths order. The report is available here:

Ofsted was obliged, in light of this, to state what actions it will take to prevent future deaths. Initially it responded by suspending inspection and by providing all of its inspectors with mental health awareness training before inspections resume in the week beginning 22 January 2024. It also provided a full and detailed response to the coroner's recommendations on Friday 19 January which can be found here.

As well as the coroner's report, a number of other reports have been published in the last month or so that make recommendations for the future of school accountability systems, and of Ofsted in particular. Three of the most significant are:

- 1. The NEU report, Beyond Ofsted. (available here)
- 2. The Institute for Public Policy Research report, Improvement through Empowerment. (available here)
- 3. The Institute for Government report, How could Ofsted and the Department for Education reform school inspections in England? (available here)

This last report in particular is realistic about the complexity and extent of any reform to the accountability system for schools, but all three reports provide different and important perspectives on the future of accountability and statutory inspection of schools.

In this context of big questions about the future of inspection, we have been asked how the Catholic Schools Inspectorate should respond to all of this.

First, it is our view that dioceses should not postpone scheduled inspections for this term,

especially as the Ofsted pause is of a limited duration. Of course, individual dioceses may make their own decisions about the timing and scheduling of inspections over the next two terms, as long as they ensure that no school falls outside of the statutory window for inspection.

Second, as an inspectorate, we are confident that all of our inspectors already approach school leaders during inspection with compassion, humility and sensitivity. This is certainly part of the training they all receive, and we, and diocesan officers, will be reminding them to remember the pressures school leaders are under, especially during inspection. Of course, they must always report without fear or favour, but honest and impartial inspection can and should still be carried out with empathy, respect and love.

Third, as an inspectorate, moving forward we will:

- 1. Explore, with Ofsted, the training they are providing for inspectors on recognising and supporting school leaders who are experiencing debilitating levels of stress during inspection and use it as the basis for future training we will provide for Catholic Schools Inspectorate inspectors nationally.
- 2. Amend future editions of the handbook to make clear that school leaders can share provisional inspection outcomes in confidence with those who are part of their wider support network, even if they do not work in the school, before the final report is shared with parents, as is the approach now with Ofsted. We already allowed the head teacher to share provisional outcomes with governors and relevant staff, but these additional allowances will be part of the training we provide for inspectors this term.



- 3. Extend all inspections, even inspections of small schools, to two days from September 2024 to ensure a greater reliability in inspection outcomes and to allow all schools to provide additional evidence on the second day of inspection, reducing the pressure on both school leaders and inspectors.
- 4. Attend carefully to the outcomes of the parliamentary enquiry into the work of Ofsted and to the response the DfE and Ofsted make to the reports already published while we discern with diocesan officers and school and system leaders what future iterations of our framework will look like. The outcome of the parliamentary enquiry will be published here as soon as it is available here.

Please be assured that inspection is an act of service not of power and is an expression of the commitment of all those involved to ensuring the best education possible for the pupils in our Catholic schools. As an inspectorate we are deeply aware of how crucial Catholic school leaders are to the educational mission of the Church and inspection should always support, and not hinder, this vital apostolate.

PPP and Capital Project Updates

Statlog

This year, we are requesting evidence from school and academies to demonstrate how Statlog data is represented in Head teacher Reports and Governing Body Minutes. The intention is to identify examples of good and effective practice to support all schools. We are particularly interested in the monitoring and management of Statutory Compliance data and how it is used by those accountable for premises and resources.

We are now entering our 5th year of using Statlog as a resource in our Diocese and we are please to report continuing improvement as school level expertise increases. Of particular note is the positive use of the system within Academy Trusts. This is usually because they have the capacity to appoint and train individuals to mange the system on behalf of all of their schools.

RAAC – Reinforced Autoclaved Aerated Concrete

We have not identified any further cases of RAAC in the last 2 months. The engagement with the DfE to provide targeted surveys has been effective and reassuring. School where RAAC has been identified continue to receive support from Diocesan colleagues, external consultants and the DfE. The Develop of the Work Funding Agreements has taken longer that expected but we are expecting the majority of those to be in place this term.

Diocesan School Regeneration Programme

The pilot schemes are all making progress. The priority this term is to establish an Oversight and Scrutiny Committee that will represent the Trustees and the Archbishop and protect the assets of the Church.

VASCA

As this financial year draws to it conclusion, our focus is divided, We are endeavouring to complete projects commissioned in 2023 whilst planning for new investment. The new School Capital Allocation is expected in April.
