- CSI self-evaluation documents are often long and time consuming. The department is looking at a shorter form to make the process easier for schools.


Year of Prayer - 2024



In preparation for the 2025 Jubilee Year 'Pilgrims of Hope', 2024 has been designated a Year of Prayer by Pope Francis. Ramadan

When is Ramadan? Monday 11th March 2024 – Tuesday 9th April 2024

What is Ramadan?

Ramadan, the ninth month in the Islamic calendar, holds immense significance for the Muslim community. During this holy month:

- Fasting is obligatory from dawn till dusk. Fasting involves abstaining from eating, drinking during daylight hours.
- Fasting is one of the Five Pillars of Islam, emphasizing piety, righteousness, and obedience to Allah's commandments.
- The pre-dawn meal before fasting begins is called "Suhoor", and the meal to break the fast after sunset (Maghrib Salah) is known as "Iftar." Traditionally, Muslims break the fast by eating a date.
- Millions of Muslims across the world observe fast during this sacred month, seeking spiritual growth, self-discipline, and closeness to Allah.



Prayer and Liturgy Directory Updates





St Vincent de Paul Primary School, Stevenage

Racial Justice, Equality and Diversity: *Practice in Schools*



School Context:

The **St Vincent de Paul school** is an excitingly diverse community, 31 languages are spoken across our families with 31% of children fitting into an EAL category. 13 out of the 17 recorded ethnic groups are represented within our school with 61% of our pupils identifying as an ethnic group other than white British. We are a white British Head and Deputy Headteacher. Our school is a happy, Catholic school that believes it upholds the values of inclusion, equality and equity both for pupils and staff. We strive to offer the



What have we done:

Our journey began in September 2022 when we applied for the 'HFL Great Representations Project'. Having been accepted on the project we began to reflect on our current practices.

We had recently reviewed and replenished our book stock with a wide selection of multicultural, diverse books for all.

We celebrated our differences and cultures in assemblies and general school life.

We made some changes to our curriculum to be more diverse.

However, following the first seminar we realised that we could and should do much more. Over the year we worked with a Hub group which consisted of 2 secondary and 2 primary schools. We listened to a range of inspirational speakers and authors. Quickly we knew we had both a personal and professional journey to go on — ultimately one of the most amazing, eye opening journeys to date!

We reflected personally and professionally as leaders. We identified early on that we needed to stop, reflect and take time to acknowledge any unconscious biases. We needed to ensure that time was given to hold a diverse lens to every though and decision made. Our mantra became "I see, I hear, I belong".

Appendix 1 'Our Journal' Written from the heart.

We reviewed our whole curriculum.

We wanted our children to see themselves in all they do. The full curriculum was reviewed and rewritten from EYFS up to Year 6. We are not the same as every other school so our curriculum had to be for us and our children!

All religious icons and pictures were reviewed to ensure they were reflective of all.

Soon the children's work started to reflect more diverse images and drawings – the way it should be!



Time to step back and look at our website. What does our website show?

Every member of staff took time to find out about their children in their class. Where are they from? What languages do they speak? Time to celebrate and acknowledge more than ever before.

Resources being ordered were checked using the diverse lens.

Our 'Great Representations' parent's meeting was held. Parents invited in so we could get information and find out how they felt.

Whole school project. A simple project where every child was given an A4 piece of paper to celebrate their family. This half term project turned out to be one of the best things we have ever done.

Our Advent assembly celebrated the traditions of our families in our school- shared with everyone.

Our Christmas celebration ended with the Hail Mary being read in different languages.

Our travelling crib visited different family homes and prayers in different languages recorded and shared back at school Quickly we realised it didn't represent our community. In fact, unconscious bias was at work. Looking through our 'Diverse Lens' we were able to stop and reflect and make some changes.

Children started to see themselves and became prouder of who they are. The diverse lens was being used in every decision and action made within the school, a time to stop and think! It was becoming a natural process.

Early Years role corners had different foods and kitchen equipment to reflect more of their homes. Small world families reflect our children and their families. The list went on and still does!

Our brave step forward...

We invited our parents to comment about how they felt. Parents commented that they wanted to be more of a community. It raised the question – what can we do to make everyone feel that they belong and feel part of a welcoming school community?

What a success! The amazing work was displayed all around the hall. Families came in after school to share every child's hard work. Families were invited to place a pin into our world map. Conversations between families began, friendships made and everyone was proud of who they are.

The gasp of children who said — that's what we do and sat up taller in assembly than they had ever done, before made it so worth the time and effort. My research and information was gathered by speaking to my parents and staff. Before I knew it, I had groups of parents sending me photos and emails, chatting on the playground. I learnt so much and I felt so supported by my school community. They realised how important they are and were rightly proud to share.

Families felt included, represented, and proud of their heritage and of who they are.

Time for families to share traditions within their family and our wider community. Children proud to return the travelling crib and share in a tradition from another country. Heartfelt prayers shared with all.



We proactively seek different places to advertise job vacancies to ensure we reach out into all communities. We reviewed our advertising to ensure it is welcoming to all.

Our weekly staff briefings reflect, remind and provoke conversations and the chance to challenge unconscious bias.

The school Parliament Team recognised the importance of celebrating our families at the front gate and want them to feel they belong from the minute they walk in.

Resources and materials are constantly reflected on. For example, the Diverse saints are those from countries where our families are from. Not only where we advertise, what we advertise and the first impressions on our website would hopefully make our school welcoming to all.

This ensures that we challenge ourselves and our unconscious bias. Ensuring our children and families feel "I see, I hear, I belong".

The children have researched the languages our families speak and are having a customised board created with welcome in all the languages. The minute anyone steps into our school, we want them to feel welcome.

Children are interested and supportive of one another. They are proud to acknowledge their similarities and differences. To know they are a valued member of the school community.

Our next steps:

We recently established a working party, that consists of parents, staff and governors. The working party will meet to review and discuss the work to date and to look for future opportunities to celebrate our diverse community.

We will continue to use the lens "I see, I hear, I belong". In ever decision made, every item bought and every image shown.
