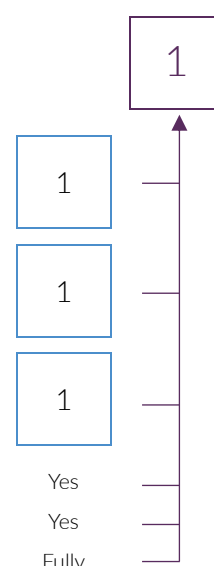

What the school does well

- The Catholic life and mission at St Joseph's is reflected in every encounter ensuring a real sense of belonging and community which is valued by all and shows the school's priority to put Christ at the heart of everything.
- Relationships throughout the school are based on the highest level of care and respect.
- The well planned religious education curriculum, underpinned by strong teacher knowledge and excellent leadership, leads to continuously improving outcomes for pupils.
- Pupils are actively engaged in supporting those in need, recognising that their mission is to serve others and understanding and living fully the school Mission, 'We follow Christ's footsteps in love.'

- Pupils are offered a wide range of opportunities to engage deeply with prayer and liturgy at St Joseph's and they do so respectfully, reverently and spontaneously.

What the school needs to improve

- Audit the current religious education programme in order to identify and deliver appropriate staff training for the full implementation of the Religious Education Directory by 2026.
- Ensure assessment for learning processes are consistent, enabling pupils to have a clear understanding of how well they are doing, what they need to do to improve and how to articulate the progress they have made.

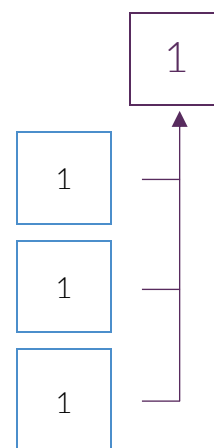

Pupils clearly understand and embrace the school's mission, 'We follow Christ's footsteps in love' and the importance of mission in everyday life and provide many examples of how they do this throughout the year. Pupils in St Joseph's show a deep respect for each other and state confidently that they feel valued and safe at school. Behaviour in class and around the school is exemplary. Pupils across the school have opportunities to become members of a range of teams including the school council, class prayer leaders and Caritas Ambassadors. This work involves identifying and leading fundraising initiatives and helping others to lead worship. Pupils take a leading role in fundraising for various charities across the year including Cafod, The Passage and Catholic Children's Society and are very clear in why they do, making links to their mission statement and to scripture. The Prayer Leaders responded to a recent local fire by arranging a fundraising drive to support their local community because 'it is important to follow Christ's example.' They were proud to tell inspectors how they contribute to the Catholic life and mission of their school with one junior pupil saying, 'We support those in need so everyone has an equal chance.' Pupils value the opportunities provided by the school to support their personal development through the wide range of clubs on offer as well as access to their own forest school, the development of new school choirs and a wide range of pastoral support including a dedicated school counsellor. Such opportunities enable the pupils to flourish. St Joseph's is equipping them to become responsible, respectful and active citizens ready to play an important part in our future society.

There is a strong culture of welcome and a striving to be exceptionally supportive to all members of the community at St Joseph's. Staff feel privileged to be a part of this community and this is evident through the high levels of care they show for one another, the pupils and their families.

One Junior School staff member said, 'I feel extremely privileged to work in such a special school that fully lives out the mission statement and that has the wellbeing of the children at its heart'. St Joseph's is inclusive and aspirational. Pupils with additional needs are given regular opportunities to engage in all aspects of school life and are well supported by the additional adults. Displays around the school are vibrant and engaging and reflect the distinctive Catholic nature of the school. During the inspection, children were completing a large 50th anniversary mosaic to add to the many other mosaics on display across the school. This all contributes to the warm and welcoming environment created and bears witness to the Catholic ethos which permeates the school. The parish priest recognised and appreciated the dedication and hard work of the staff and acknowledged the impact on the pupils, commenting on the pupils' strong knowledge and ongoing development of Catholic practice. The provision of relationship, sex and health education is strong and meets all the statutory and diocesan guidelines and makes cross curricular links where relevant and appropriate.

This is an outstanding Catholic school. The Executive head teacher and senior leaders, including the RE leads, share a commitment to ensuring that their Catholic faith is central to this community. They are very well supported by the governing body, many of whom take an active part in the weekly life of the school and parish. Leaders and governors are inspirational witnesses to the Gospel in their direction of the school at every level. They strive to provide the highest levels of pastoral care for staff and to serve with sensitivity those in greatest need in their community. The parish priest from St Joseph's, alongside his brother priests, supports the school very well by leading Masses and liturgies throughout the year. Staff show love and care for each other and all pupils, bearing witness to the school's commitment to enable all to flourish. Governors rightly see the school as a source of inspiration to the whole community and are highly ambitious about its contribution to the lives of the people it serves. They are passionate about their role within the school, supporting and challenging leaders and have prioritised investment of resources in this area. Leaders are highly committed to the further development of all staff which has led to high levels of confidence amongst staff.

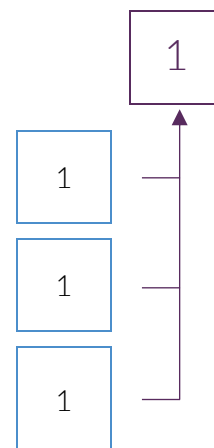

Pupils' positive attitude to learning alongside their excellent behaviour leads to outstanding outcomes in religious education. Knowledge and understanding is secure in all classes due to high levels of expertise among staff who build on prior learning and deepen pupils' understanding through skilled questioning. Pupils are actively engaged in lessons; they are reflective and committed to improving their knowledge. This was observed in Year 6 when pupils were looking at the role of women in scripture and were able to make links between Miriam's Well and identify metaphoric wells in their own lives. Pupils are encouraged to work collaboratively in lessons and show good levels of independence when completing set written tasks. This increased independence now means that pupils are ready to take more responsibility for their own learning. They speak proudly and confidently about their work in religious education. The use of scripture across the whole school is strong and used effectively and Bibles are treated with the upmost reverence, in lessons, during class worship and in assemblies. Pupils are familiar with and can make links between events and characters in the Bible and how this influences how we live today. Outcomes for all pupils are excellent and in line with other core subjects. Leaders have recognised the need to review and adapt current assessment strategies in order to support pupils in knowing how well they are doing and how to improve further.

A well-planned Key Stage 2 curriculum, linked to the new *Directory*, supports the development of excellent religious literacy for all pupils. There is a strong focus on scripture, prayers and reflection in lessons as well as a commitment to weave Catholic social teaching into all topics. Additional high-quality resources, including effective support staff, are used to optimise learning for all. Staff are enthusiastic about teaching religious education and ensure that it is given the highest priority. They are very well-supported and offered many excellent training opportunities including the Catholic Certificate in Religious Education, held by many teachers. Bespoke

planning sessions with religious education coordinators, RE consultants and senior leaders are provided to develop teachers' subject knowledge and to promote collaboration and progression. For example, the development of knowledge and skills when Years 3-6 are learning about Miriam's role as a person of faith and a prophet, and linking this to how pupils can be an inspiration and prophet for others. As a result, teachers are confident in their delivery of the subject and ensure that lessons are engaging and challenging for all pupils. One parent noted 'My son loves RE and often can relate things learnt in RE to other subjects and also day to day life – thank you!' The use of scripture and art across the whole school is notable. Strong teaching means pupils are familiar with and can make links between events and characters in the Bible and how this influences how we live today.

The executive head teacher, governors and leaders have very high expectations and ensure that staff are exceptionally well supported in implementing the religious education curriculum. Continuing professional development is not only provided within the school but also through partnerships and invitations to other local schools and with the diocese. The religious education coordinators support teachers during in-school sessions and both leaders work effectively together to ensure their vision leads to improvements in teaching and learning. Staff speak of the excellent support they are given from senior leaders in the school to improve standards and expressed how valued they feel in their roles. The governors accurately understand the strengths of the school's provision and outcomes and ensure a generous budget to support religious education across the school. Through the religious education curriculum, St Joseph's lives out its mission to 'Follow Christ's footsteps in Love'.

St Joseph's is a school with prayer and worship at the very centre. There are many opportunities for pupil engagement throughout the day and week including regular Masses in the parish and school, gospel assemblies and a range of high-profile liturgical events. Pupils engage in all experiences with reverence, confidence and respect. They are able to pray communally, spontaneously and in silence, and can clearly articulate how these prayer experiences shape how they think and act. All events are celebrated and shared via the school website and weekly newsletters. Staff, including leaders, provide prayerful opportunities that allow pupils time for reflection leading to a commitment to carry out their mission and to 'make a big difference.' Music and singing are integral to worship and pupils join in joyfully and confidently. A range of prayer spaces are available including the new prayer garden designed with the prayer leaders as well as the newly relocated and beautifully decorated prayer room which is available for all pupils, parents and staff to 'gather together in God's name'.

The school ensures that the richness and breadth of the Catholic tradition is covered in the experiences offered to pupils. In classroom prayer there is an excellent use of resources to help pupils meditate and reflect. The use of scripture in prayer and liturgy is very well embedded across the school. Acts of worship are age appropriate and pupils in the junior school are skilled at preparing and leading these acts, choosing liturgically appropriate scripture, music and resources. The prayer garden, prayer room, hall and classroom displays ensure that the school is conducive to prayer. The many opportunities to contribute to the school's prayer life is evidenced through well-used class floor books of which pupils are rightly proud and keen to share. Pupils know where in the school they can go to be quiet, reflect or to get spiritual support from their peers and the class prayer leaders. The executive head teacher, with her staff, prioritises family engagement and support in all areas of school life. A liturgical events

calendar is shared with families inviting them to join in all celebrations with the pupils. Inspectors joined the parent prayer group held in the prayer garden, which was well attended by parents and governors.

Prayer and liturgy are an outstanding feature of St Joseph's because of the vision and commitment of its leaders. They have developed a strong culture, which promotes the importance of spiritual development and the space for prayer and liturgy. The school plans for progression with a policy that spans all year groups. Parents are very happy with the leadership in this area, summed up by one parent saying, 'It's lovely to see my children participate in Mass so fervently along with their peers. My children have grown so well spiritually at St Joseph's.' Governors and leaders ensure that ample resources are provided to allow for development in all areas of Catholic life including collective worship meaning high quality prayer resources are available for all pupils. As a result of outstanding leadership in collective worship, the pupil voice clearly articulates how much they enjoy being at St Joseph's and how they grow in their faith.
